## Year 1 (Phase 1) Activities

- Conduct a comprehensive community needs assessment
- Engage in planning and capacity building activities to prepare for implementation of home visiting program
- 3) Develop and submit an Implementation Plan as part of the Non-Competing Continuation Application for Year 2 (Phase 2) funds

## Implementation Plan

 For FY 2010 Grantees, Implementation Plan will be due by July 31, 2011 (10 months after grant award)

 ACF will provide detailed Implementation Plan guidance to FY 2010 grantees no later than June 2011

## Implementation Plan: Section 1

#### Section 1: Community Needs Assessment

- Grantees must:
  - Identify and characterize the targeted at-risk community(ies) where you will implement a home visiting program
  - Identify the quality and capacity of existing programs or initiatives for early childhood home visiting in the target community(ies)
  - Assess the community(ies)'s capacity for providing substance abuse treatment and counseling services
  - Assess the community(ies)'s capacity to integrate home visiting services into an early childhood system, including an assessment existing or ongoing efforts or resources to develop a coordinated early childhood system at the community level.

# Section 2: Home Visiting Program Goals and Objectives

 Grantees must specify the goal(s) and objectives of the proposed program, and include a logic model identifying inputs, outputs, and short- and long-term outcomes.

## Section 3: <u>Selection of Proposed Home Visiting Model(s) to Meet Identified Community Needs</u>

- Grantees must describe:
  - The home visiting model(s) selected to respond to the needs identified in the targeted community(ies)
  - How the chosen model(s) responds to identified needs
  - How the community has been and will be engaged in the selection and implementation of the model(s)
  - Their process for developing any adaptations or enhancements to models in consultation with the original model developer

## Section 4: Plan for Effective Implementation of Home Visiting Program

- Grantees must provide a plan for the effective implementation of the home visiting program
  - Plans for working with model developers and the community to address fit between the chosen model(s) and the cultural traditions of the community
  - Recruitment, training, professional development, and supervision of home visiting personnel
  - Recruitment and retention of families
  - Ongoing monitoring of implementation quality
  - Coordination among existing home visiting programs
  - Plan for ensuring that the home visiting program is part of a comprehensive, aligned early childhood system in the community

#### Section 7: Plan for Administration of Home Visiting Program

 Grantees must describe the administrative infrastructure that will support the home visiting program, such as the fiscal and administrative management plan, job descriptions and organizational charts, management capacity, collaborative partners, and other essential infrastructure
