Community Based Child Abuse Prevention-CBCAP

- × Title II of CAPTA (Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act)
- × Formula grant program
- × Every year a Lead Agency, designated by the Governor, applies for and administers the funds
- × \$42.5 million
- × 1% set aside for tribal/ migrant programs



Title II of Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act (CAPTA)

3 primary purposes in legislation:

- + To support community-based efforts to develop, operate, expand, and where appropriate to network, initiatives aimed at the prevention of child abuse and neglect;**
- + To support coordinated resources and activities to better strengthen and support families to reduce the incidence of child abuse and neglect; and**
- + To foster the understanding, appreciation and knowledge of diverse populations to effectively prevent child abuse and neglect.**



Examples of programs funded

- × Voluntary home visiting
- × Parent education /skills
- × Parent mutual support/ self-help
- × Public awareness campaigns
- × Respite care/ crisis care
- × Community outreach and referral
- × Family resource centers
- × Family support services



Outreach activities for special populations

- × Vulnerable families at risk of abuse or neglect
- × Special focus on specific populations:
 - × Parents (all, new, teens, etc)
 - × Parents/ children with disabilities
 - × Racial and ethnic minorities
 - × Members of underserved or underrepresented groups
 - × Fathers



1% set aside for tribal and migrant populations

- × Provide financial support to Tribes, Tribal Organizations, and Migrant Programs for child abuse prevention programs and activities that are consistent with the goals outlined by Title II of CAPTA.
- × This legislation specifies that 1% of the available funding from Title II will be reserved to fund Tribes, Tribal Organizations and Migrant Programs.
- × The goal of the programs and activities supported by these funds is to prevent the occurrence or recurrence of abuse or neglect within Tribal and Migrant populations.



Tribal and Migrant Set-Aside Grantees

- × Grand Traverse Band (GTB) of Ottawa & Chippewa Indians Location: Suttons Bay, Michigan
- × Indian Child Welfare Consortium Location: Temecula, California
- × Yakima Valley Farm Workers Clinic Location: Toppenish, Washington



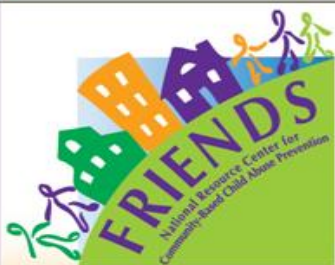

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

Collaboration

Why is collaboration a priority area for CBCAP?

Collaboration and coordination is a focus for CBCAP in order to maximize the use of limited prevention dollars. By working with other existing efforts and coordinating service delivery, states and communities can prevent service overlap and reach more families. To emphasize this, the [2010 Program Instructions \(PI\)](#) states, "Given the limited funding available for prevention services, lead agencies are strongly encouraged to find ways to partner with other public and private organizations serving the same populations and sharing the same goals and objectives." In addition, Attachment 4 of the 2009 PI provides a list of programs for potential coordination and collaboration with CBCAP. To view that list, [click here](#).

What does collaboration in CBCAP mean?

The best way to illustrate this is to turn to the PI again. Around collaboration, the [2010 PI](#) states,

"The most effective way to meet the challenge of preventing child abuse and neglect is for all child abuse prevention and treatment programs, public and private, to work together in partnership with families and other disciplines such as social services, health and mental health, child care, early childhood, education, law enforcement and other advocacy groups in the community to achieve their common goals."
